H-1 First National Bank, 1059 G

The Eymann family built this beautiful structure in 1907.

H-2 Reedley Opera House and Turn of the Century corner, 1720 10th

This block was built in 1903 by Jesse Jansen, it is now listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The corner was the site of the original Reedley State Bank.

H-3 Reedley Historical Museum, 1752 10th

Built in 1917 to house Reedley's first City Hall, it became our museum in 1979.

H-4 Granger's Warehouse, 10th and RR tracks

Built as a shipping point for Reedley's thriving grain industry in 1892, this was the largest grain warehouse west of the Mississippi.

H-5 Marlar House, 759 G

This classic home was built in 1905.

H-6 Pioneer Park, 8th and G

Built in the early 1920's, Pioneer Park is across from our current City Hall and Police Station.

H-7 Farmers and Merchants Bank, 1000 G

Built in 1908, the original granite columns still stand outside the main entrance.

H-8 Bollin/Matthews Hardware and Masonic Lodge, 1010 G

Built c. 1912, this building now houses the famed Mennonite Central Committee's Quilting Room upstairs.

H-9 Reedley Hotel, 1619 11th

Originally built by Reedley's namesake, T.L. Reed in 1888, it burned in 1902, was rebuilt but burned again in 1910, then was finally rebuilt as you see it in 1911.

H-10 St. Anthony's Catholic Church, 1060 F

Built in 1907 by parishioners with rocks brought by horse and wagon from Smith Mountain, 8 miles east.

H-11 Reedley National Bank, 1100 G

Built in 1920 for the Farmers and Merchants Bank which later became the Reedley National Bank, which in turn was taken over by the Bank of Italy, and finally by the Bank of America. Building is on the National Register of Historic Places.

H-12 Hotel Grand, 12th and G

Originally built as a three-story hotel in 1891 and known as the New Reedley Hotel, a huge fire consumed the top level in 1929. The hotel has had many names with Hotel Grand being the best known.

H-13 Model Rooming House and Besaw Photography, 1123 G

Built c. 1912, this building was home to several early Reedley businesses, including Reedley's first photographer, Geo. Besaw.

H-14 Winnes Hotel, 1726 11th

One of Reedley's finest hotels was built in 1913 and renovated in 1976 as the Hotel Burgess.
